Pennies for a Just Cause

Few people know so clearly what they want. Most people can't even think what to hope for when they throw a penny in a fountain.

Most of us have more than a few unused pennies lying around, just waiting for a hope they can be tossed toward. And the Delaware Chapter of the Episcopal Peace Fellowship (EPF) has just the solution, inviting people from all walks of life to join them in collecting pennies for a very just cause.

For almost two years, the chapter, based at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Georgetown, has been collecting pennies from their parishioners and other area churches, youth groups, and local organizations. Their goal is to collect 44 million pennies as a reminder of the estimated number of innocent non-combatant victims of global armed conflicts or innocent civilians who have died of disease

and hunger because of these conflicts since World War II.

The Pennies Project recently garnered a bucketful of pennies collected by Thomas Smith, Field Engineer assigned to a contract in Martinsburg, West Virginia, after his mother, Ginny Wright, a Delaware Chapter EPF member, explained the project to him. "My son placed this bucket in his office and his coworkers were very generous in responding to our project. If everyone in the local area contacted family, friends, church members, and co-workers, this project could have monumental and far-reaching effects," commented Ms. Wright.

The long-term plan for the Pennies Project is to store them until the 44 million goal is reached and to donate the proceeds to agencies working to relieve the suffering of civilian victims of violent conflicts.

Innocent civilian victims will also be honored in a day of remembrance at St. Paul's Episcopal Church on November 2, at the "Witness for Innocent Victims of Armed Conflicts" service. The Delaware Chapter of the Episcopal Peace Fellowship was formed as one way to address issues of peace and justice in the local and global communities. The EPF strives to connect all who seek a deliberate response to local and global injustices and to pray for peace. Meetings are held at 10:00 a.m. the first Saturday of every month.

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Blessed To Serve

This summer I began my eleventh year as bishop. The time has passed very quickly. I enjoy this ministry and believe that the old expression must be true. Time does seem to fly! Delaware is a good place to serve. I feel blessed to be bishop of Delaware.

Our churches – large and small – are doing well. I have heard wonderful stories over the summer about day camps, mission trips, vacation bible schools, and other ministries sponsored by our congregations. Camp Arrowhead celebrated its 55th anniversary by serving over 800 campers. Memorial House welcomed families from across the state for a summer week at the beach. Delaware's Episcopal schools and early childhood programs are opening their doors for another year. Sunday schools and parish education ministries are beginning again.

All these ministries are facets of our fundamental mission. God has planted us here in Delaware. God's Spirit has sustained us for over 300 years. We are here to be and to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ. All that we do and say carries the potential for redemption, reconciliation, and renewal. Our greatest resource for this ministry is our people. Delaware has great people. I continue to be grateful for the opportunity to work with the lay people and clergy of our diocese. Your vitality, generosity, and faithful service are a real blessing.

It is my hope that more and more people in the state of Delaware will hear the good news of Jesus Christ through the Episcopal Church. Last spring we had a Diocesan Clergy Day devoted to practical ways to welcome new members into our churches. This winter we will host a clergy conference focusing on Christian community, diversity, inclusion, and hospitality. These topics are vitally important as we share the good news in a contemporary world. I hope that every congregation and vestry will make evangelism a priority. We have a good story to tell. What better way to be a good neighbor in our growing state.

The Gospel teaches that all of us are ultimately accountable to Jesus Christ and must be judged by him. Jesus' commandment to us is to "love one another." The standard for this love is the way we treat the least, the most vulnerable, among us. As I come to your churches on my parish visitations, I always look forward to hearing remarkable stories of Christian service by individuals and groups in your congregations.

Over the last four years our diocese has been recruiting and training our first class of deacons. Ordained deacons are called to teach and lead us, by their example, deeper into ministries of service. On Saturday, December 5, at 1:00 p.m., we will ordain six new deacons at St. Stephen's, Harrington, to serve here in Delaware. They have worked faithfully to complete the deacon's training program. They have the support of their



sponsoring congregations. They are already actively involved in ministries of Christian service. By their example they will be living reminders of our need to live by the words of Jesus, "Come ye blessed of my Father, for I was hungry and you fed me, a stranger and you took me in, sick and you took care of me, in prison and you visited me. Inasmuch as you did it to the

least of these, you did it to me."

Just before Labor Day our new Diocesan Youth Council hosted the first annual "Bishop's Bash." What is a "Bishop's Bash" you ask? Youth and youth sponsors from around the diocese gathered at St. Thomas's, Newark for an evening of food, fun, and dancing. In the midst of the evening we gathered for a "question & answer" session. For 45 minutes, youth could ask the bishop any question they wanted. The questions ranged from "How tall are you?" to "What gives you the most satisfaction in your job as bishop?" It was both interesting and great fun. A new Delaware tradition was born. I am excited by the growing ministry of our Diocesan Youth Council and Teri Valente, our youth coordinator. I hope that congregations will make ministry to young people a priority. It is an important way to touch lives in Christ's Name.

So much of what we do and can accomplish is founded on generosity. We are surrounded by an abundance of God's grace. We share that abundance by giving generously of our time, our talent, and our money. Our gifts take on added meaning and power when considered in the context and challenges many face. You need to know of my respect and appreciation for every sacrifice and generous gift offered in the Name of Christ. Remarkable things continue to happen because of your generosity.

As my eleventh year begins, my sense is that another good and productive season for ministry lies ahead. As always, I am grateful to be serving with you in Delaware. You will all be in my prayers for God's abiding presence and blessing on your lives and ministries every day.

The following candidates are needed:

- **The Standing Committee** handles matters of the clergy and ecclesiastical authority. *Needed:* One clergy member and one lay member – both for a four-year term.
- **The Trustees of the Diocese** provide financial, custodial, trust, and investment services for the diocese. *Needed:*

One clergy or lay member (Mr. Tom Sombar is eligible for re-election) for a six-year term.

- **The Constitution and Canons Committee** deals with all matters relating to the constitution and canons of the diocese. *Needed:* One lay member for a five-year term (Mr. Dan Bennett is eligible for re-election). One lay or clergy member for a four year term.

- **The Trial Court** deals with the adjudication of ecclesiastical matters. *Needed:* One clergy member for a five-year term (the Rev. Ed Godden is eligible for re-election).

- **The Diocesan Council** is responsible for program and budget for the work and mission of the diocese. *Needed:* Two clergy members, three lay-at-large members, one lay member from Region I (Sussex County) – each for a three year term.

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Sussex Episcopal Ministry Work-Camp: Small in Numbers, Mighty in Effort

Last spring the *Communion* told the story of Tom McCormick, a candidate for the diaconate, and his inspiration for building a local home-repair ministry to serve challenged families in Sussex County. As Tom now moves closer to ordination, here is a story about the next leg of his journey to the diaconate.

Sussex Episcopal Ministry Work-Camp had its first effort this summer: a mini work-camp orchestrated from Camp Arrowhead on August 12-14. The camp addressed several significant home repairs for Sussex County residents in need.

Harry Burlew, Richard Jesnick, Joe Reardon, Bob Davis, and Mark and Noah West of Saint Martha's, Bethany Beach, Teri and Kathy Smith-Jones of Saint George's Chapel, Harbeson, and Sarah Tufano of Immaculate Heart of Mary, Wilmington, gathered on Wednesday, August 12 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon for orientation and job-related instructions. Kelly Steed and Walt Ottinger of the First State Resource, Conservation and Development Council of Delaware (the organization which provided access to the home sites where the repairs were done) and I lead the session. After lunch, workers had the remainder of the day to enjoy leisure activities at beautiful Camp Arrowhead on the Rehoboth Bay. After dinner the group enjoyed a pontoon ride together and concluded the day with compline.

Thursday and Friday began with an 8:00 a.m. breakfast before heading out to the job sites in nearby Long Neck and Lewes. On Thursday the workers were divided into two teams with job coaches Harry Burlew and Richard Jesnick leading the way to constructing pressure treated railings, installing new floor tile in a kitchen and laundry room, repairing damaged flooring in two bedrooms, replacing bathroom flooring, and installing new tiles. On Friday while the teams were finishing the original assignments, Richard Jesnick and Mark West ventured to Lewes where they spent the day replacing four windows in a mobile home.

Evening activities included a Thursday presentation on bird watching atop Camp Arrowhead's environmental center by Jeff Gordon, a bird specialist for over thirty years. Following dinner on Friday, Fr. Chris Moore of Saint George's Chapel and All Saint's parish celebrated Eucharist along the waterfront.

Work-camp participants evaluated the experience as a very rewarding outreach that they would participate in again – one that they would highly recommend to others. Although the number of participants was small this year, they cannot be praised enough for their effort and team cooperation in completing three work assignments in two days.

New Castle

The parishioners at **Calvary Hillcrest in Wilmington** are undertaking a major bathroom renovation to support their vital day care ministry.

The renovation of the organ at **Christ Church Christiana Hundred, Greenville**, is now complete, leaving the congregation with an instrument that is, according to organist and choir-master Bill Owen, "better than when it was built."

The children of **Good Shepherd, Glasgow**, celebrated the end of the church school year with their third annual Children's Sunday, providing leadership throughout the liturgy.

Twenty choir members from **Immanuel Church, Highlands, Wilmington** made a memorable weekend trip to New York City, where they joined another sixty singers from the choirs of Trinity Lutheran Church, Perkasio, PA, and

Church of the Holy Spirit, Harleysville, to sing the morning Eucharist at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine. As Jack Burnam, choir-master, put it, "It was a thrill to see our hard work and preparation come to fruition, as we offered our gifts of music in this great space dedicated to the worship of God."

St. Anne's, Middletown, hosted a "Family Vacation Bible School" on Wednesday nights in July, focusing on the Bible's call to risk and serve and then providing organized community service projects for families on Saturdays.

St. James Mill Creek, Wilmington, has made a commitment to be a support congregation for Family Promise, a national interfaith organization new to Delaware that has been providing food and hospitality to homeless families since 1988. The organization works with support congregations to provide accommodations, meals, and case management to help families move from homelessness to self-sufficiency.

Sussex

The Way Home Program is receiving help from the people of **St. John's, Milton**, who are collecting work boots for those leaving correctional facilities.

St. Mary's, Bridgeville, sold nearly 5,000 items through their uniform closet ministry, raising over \$1,100 for the Woodbridge School District.

The people of **St. Peter's, Lewes**, are adding another service to accommodate the growth in their congregation and to serve the needs of those for whom Sunday morning worship is not accessible. The 5:00 p.m. service, called "Communion of Light," harkens back to ancient Christian traditions and begins on September 27. According to Donna Beecher, head of the music and liturgy committee, the service "averages around 45 minutes, permitting one to attend this service and then perhaps enjoy an extended evening with dinner and friends here in Lewes, making it a great way to start one's week."
